



The role of a pathology collector

Based in the many suburban and regional centres, pathology collectors are the face of Melbourne Pathology.

A pathology collector must be technically competent and reliable, caring and compassionate. Their role is to collect samples from patients including blood, urine, faeces and swabs, take delivery of samples and process them ready for pick-up by couriers. All staff undertake comprehensive in-house training upon commencement to complement their assumed skills gained via a basic qualification.

Work environment

Pathology collectors at Melbourne Pathology are required to work in the following positions:

Collection centre pathology collector - Collects specimens from patients in our collection centres. These may be stand-alone facilities or attached to medical centres. Most of our pathology collectors are posted to collection centres.

Domiciliary pathology collector - Collects specimens from patients in their homes, or from patients in institutions such as aged care facilities. This is a highly personal job, offering home based services to patients who are unable to attend a clinic or collection centre.

Hospital pathology collector - Collects specimens from patients in hospitals where we provide pathology services.

What skills and personal qualities do I need to be a pathology collector?

Pathology collectors play a vital role within the healthcare system and require the following:

- Certificate III in Pathology Collection or previous sufficient experience in a similar position in Australia. Melbourne Pathology does not offer the relevant course and candidates wishing to complete the course are advised to refer to relevant Registered Training Organisations' websites for course information
- Empathy for patients and families
- A commitment to providing excellent medical care for patients
- A commitment to providing excellent service to doctors, hospital and clinic staff
- Excellent computer skills
- Good written and oral communication skills
- An adequate level of physical fitness to perform the tasks
- Demonstrated ability to deliver excellent customer service

What else do I need to do to become a pathology collector?

- Must be an Australian Resident or have the right to work in Australia
- Must hold a current Victorian Drivers Licence
- A satisfactory Australian Police Check
- Evidence of Hepatitis B vaccination
- A background in healthcare is an advantage

What does the job offer me?

- Supportive team environment
- High level of professional training
- High degree of personal responsibility
- Flexible work arrangements
- Satisfaction of helping/caring for members of the community
- Complete Melbourne Pathology uniform

Where would I be working?

We operate over 300 accredited collection centres in Melbourne and regional areas of Victoria and you would be employed within an area. Each area consists of a number of collection centres. You would not be assigned to any one particular collection centre. We would try to employ you within a convenient distance to your home.

What are the hours of work?

Most commonly, shifts are between 8am and 6pm Monday to Sunday, however hospital based staff and some domiciliary staff will be rostered up to 10pm. Part time staff are required to participate in the weekend roster.

What training would I receive?

Melbourne Pathology provides an introductory training program for successful applicants joining the Patient Services team. Successful applicants would be required to commit to full time paid in-house training upon commencement for a minimum of eight weeks. Melbourne Pathology also offers employees ongoing skills development to maintain best practice.
